Turnbaugh Trust – An Update

Praise God from whom all blessings flow!

As most of you know, RUMC received a huge blessing in 2013, a bequest from the estate of Eleanore and Walter Turnbaugh. Eleanore was the daughter of Rachel Bruehl for whom our church library is named. The Turnbaughs had no children, but they left the bulk of their estate in trust to the RUMC library.

Where we began. In 2012, the church was notified that there would be a bequest and that it would be substantial. Some meetings were held, but the only decision that was made was to wait until we knew more.

In late 2014, a team was assembled to work with a facilitator to formulate a recommendation to the Charge Conference about how the money would be disbursed. By that time, we knew that it was a larger amount of money than we knew at the beginning. The recommendation team first developed a mission statement for the library and then a process for requesting grants that were to be consistent with the mission of the library. The team also developed a recommendation that we petition the court to broaden the scope of the trust to allow money to be used for capital improvements.

The recommendation was approved by our Charge Conference on February 15, 2015.

The steps for using the funds are as follows:

- 1. The Library Team develops their budget and submits it to the Church Council.
- 2. Remaining funds may be used for grants that are in keeping with the library's mission statement.
- 3. Any monies leftover at the end of the year may be used for capital improvement.
- 4. The process includes an agreement that the monies deposited in a calendar year be reserved for the next calendar year's expenditures.

Early this year, the trustees made a recommendation that we invest in ourselves by paying the mortgage with Turnbaugh funds and then *paying the Turnbaugh Fund back* at a low interest rate over 10 years. This strategy will save the church \$180,000 +/- in interest and puts the fund monies to use in the meantime.

There have been some people who have asked how we can make any additional grants when we put out roughly \$555,000 to pay off the mortgage. As I mentioned above, this is a huge blessing! We began 2017 with over \$850,000 in the account, and even with investing in the mortgage and taking care of several significant capital projects, there will be adequate funds for next year's grant programs. We received interest deposits quarterly and mortgage payments are made every month.

The trust is generating roughly \$397,000 per year. Through this amazing gift, RUMC has been able to provide educational and supportive programming for the community

of our neighborhood, the conference, and even around the world. We thought you might like an update on how this wonderful gift is being used.

2017 Program Projects (and a few submitted in 2016 that are still in process):

- Youth Leader Training It has been a long time since youth leader training was available in our conference. Susan Harry and 2 other district youth leaders applied for some funding to bring some <u>excellent</u> training to local church leadership, most of whom are volunteers. That training took place October 13-15. Ask Susan about it!
- **RUMC Nursery School** Turnbaugh funds have provided several enrichment programs for our nursery school such as Black Rock Reptiles. (No, Pastor Vivian did not attend!) Even more exciting, this is the first year when we have been able to offer scholarship help to some families who would not have been able to access a quality preschool experience for all of their children because they would have had 2 or 3 children in at one time.
- **Tech Upgrades** Modern libraries are multi-media centers, and when our mics and projectors developed problems this year, the Turnbaugh Fund was able to fund some much-needed equipment for Sunday the sanctuary.
- Small Group Studies The Turnbaugh Fund has been providing books and supportive resources for many of our studies like last winter's Bible Overview and the Lenten study.
- **Care Team** Resources for our seniors like a devotional book for those over 90, *The Upper Room* for our homebound folks are provided as a gift of the Turnbaugh Trust.
- Education Until the trust, RUMC usually bought the bare minimum of resources for our VBS in the summer. Through the trust, we are able to provide some of the "extras" for the first time to the delight of our children!
- Summer Day Camp for Baltimore City In 2015, the Conference Retreat and Camping Ministry applied for and received funding for a day camp in parts of Baltimore hardest hit during the crisis following Freddie Gray's death. In 2016, the funding partner no longer offered such grants. RUMC has been able to fund this program for the last 2 years a great benefit to youth and children in Baltimore,
- Youth and Young Adult Ministry The trust has provided grants to supplement the summer mission trip and care packages for our college students. Additionally, the trust is funding a ministry exploration seminar for one of our young adults planning to go into professional ministry!
- Excitement Sunday Since we hadn't done a special back-to-church kind of event for awhile, we did not budget for Excitement Sunday. Thanks to the Turnbaugh Trust, it was a very special celebration and very special day!

Capital Improvements funded by the Trust (thus far)

- Repair of the Northside Chapel Wall (north) and Roof
- Replacement of office roof
- Replacement of HVAC for Main Sanctuary
- Upgrades to the Food Pantry facility

Finally, given the scope of the destruction of the storms in Texas, Florida, and Puerto Rico, the

team received a request to give away some of the money from the trust to the victims of the storms. It is, admittedly, outside the primary mission for the funds. However, this was a "what would God have us do?" moment. The team was in one accord in deciding to match funds donated by our congregation to UMCOR, the United Methodist Committee on Relief. It is a 6 to 1 match, with a cap of \$50,000. What an amazing gift – and more, it is an amazing gift made possible by the awesome generosity of donors who had no idea what their gift could do.

I hope that you find this a helpful update, and I urge you to contact me or <u>any member</u> of the TTT (Turnbaugh Trust Team – listed below for your information) with any questions. You may ask about our church's finances at any time, and reports on our operating budget are made to the church council at every meeting. You are welcome to join us!

From the Library



Book Club will meet in our library on Wednesday, November 15th. We will be discussing the book, *Pretty Paper* by Willie Nelson

More than 50 years ago, Willie Nelson found the inspiration to write a classic Christmas song while he was standing on a Fort Worth street corner. Now, all this time later, he has turned *Pretty Paper* into a sweet holiday-themed novel.

There's a story behind the story. Nelson, who in the early 1960s had yet to establish himself as one of the giants of country music, spotted a disabled street vendor selling colorful papers, pencils and ribbons in front of Leonard's Department Store in downtown Fort Worth.

"Pretty papers!" the man called out. "Pretty ribbons!"



Alas, the peddler, his legs amputated above the knees, wasn't making any sales that day. Nelson was so moved by the sad visual that he wrote *Pretty Paper*, an ironic Christmas song that combines a pleasing melody with poignant lyrics.

The song, initially recorded by Roy Orbison in 1963, was subsequently a hit for Nelson in 1964 and since has been covered by many A-list recording artists, including Glenn Campbell, Randy Travis, Kenny Chesney and Chris Isaak.

In the book, we meet Willie (our first-person narrator) more or less as he was in the early 1960s: an aspiring singer-songwriter who's eking out a living in Fort Worth playing in dive clubs and honkytonks.

On one happy day when he has a few extra dollars in his pocket, Willie heads downtown to do some Christmas shopping at Leonard's. Then he sees the peddler whose bleak situation inspires these lyrics: "Should you stop? Better not, much too busy/You're in a hurry -- my how does time fly/In the distance the ringing of laughter/And in the midst of the laughter he cries."
