From the Pastor's Desk

We Are One Aren't we?

The more I learn, the more I know how little I know.

For a long time, I was kind of proud and kind of ashamed of my high school experience. For those of you unfamiliar with Baltimore City Schools, there were 4 highly academic high schools that were segregated *by gender*, and Rich and I, along with our brothers and sisters all went to those schools. (In both of our homes, we were divided by the schools we attended. I went to Eastern, my sisters went to Western. Rich's brothers divided 2 to Poly and 2 to City, and the rivalry was intense on the day of the City-Poly football game, always held on Thanksgiving Day. Rich's dad, a Baltimore City police officer, always threatened that if the fighting got too crazy, he'd send them all to Southern!)

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I was a high school student when Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. was shot and killed and racial violence and distrust were palpable. I will never forget the fear and the unease we all felt on the night we were presenting our spring musical program, all dressed up in costumes to do our particular part (I was part of a trio singing *Three Little Maids from School* from *The Mikado*) when for some reason, maybe just to get a breath of cooler air, we opened the back stage door and saw the Baltimore skyline bright with fire, burning the stores and other buildings on North Avenue.

The "problems" in the City were the "problems" in the whole country. And those problems created a bubbling cauldron of unrest and suspicion in my high school. We held the distinction, in my senior year, if I remember correctly, of being the first school in the City to have riots <u>in</u> the school. Most of us were dumbfounded. Many of us were afraid. Some of us were angry. And some of us just didn't have a clue as to why this was happening.

I served as a hall monitor outside the cafeteria every day, along with a variety of other girls. One of the girls, whose name I don't remember and who I knew only from our shared cafeteria duty, sat beside me every day. We chatted about everything and nothing. We thought of each other as friends in the way high school kids can be friends without having a deep relationship. After the big, scary riot, violence continued to break out almost every day in the cafeteria. Day

after day, food was thrown, girls screamed at each other and at the staff. And then one day, my partner began to cry. She laid her head on my chest, sobbing, and said, "I am just so afraid." She was African-American. All I could do was hold her and comfort her.

There was a scathing report of the issues that led to the unrest at Eastern, identifying behaviors, particularly of the staff, that were discriminatory to the Black girls in our school.

I had always been proud that our school had a very large African-American population – maybe even 50/50 or majority Black. I have never actually sat down with the yearbook to see how accurate my perception was. What I know is that being an Easternite had a profound effect on my life.

Fast-forward to 1995 or so. I was responsible for the camping program of the annual conference, and I met a woman that I was <u>sure</u> I had known from somewhere else but just couldn't place her. Finally, we figured out that she was a teacher at Eastern when I was a student. She taught in the business or Home Ec. department, so our paths didn't cross a whole lot, but since I was the editor of the yearbook, I knew most everyone at least by picture and name. I also learned that this woman was a devout Christian who stood up and advocated for biblical justice as she understood it – so much so that she was called before the House Committee on UnAmerican Activities, accused of being a Communist.

Imagine my shock when, upon learning that we were at Eastern at the same time and lived through all of the unrest more or less together, the teacher said to me one day, "everything was always so nice and pleasant at Eastern." She went on to say she had never been able to figure out why "those girls" caused so much trouble. The teacher whose careless comment sparked the first riot was one of her good friends.

I was never so ashamed as when I heard a person who was a personal icon make such an unconsciously biased statement. Honestly, that was the moment when I began to question my own perceptions of life at Eastern.

You see, I had been in the top academic classes – college prep it was called in those days. Our classes were rich and filled with young women of both races who had great support systems in their families. We were smart and had the kind of grounding that allowed us to be at the "top of our game." And we thought – we assumed – things were pretty much equal.

I had thought I was "color blind."

The problem with that is when we are blind, there are things we just don't see.

There were many more girls in our school whose life situation was very different from mine and who felt the sting of bias and racism every day in school and out of school. And they were sad, angry, and perplexed as to how those promises of getting ahead just didn't apply to them.

That encounter with the teacher from Eastern was maybe the first time I began to see how I make assumptions based on a person's appearance or race and even whether I <u>truly</u> saw others as honest -to-God equal. It took a long time before I began to see how race or neighborhood was a

determining factor in how people are treated by us as a society. I still find myself basing judgments on race and appearance from time to time, much to my discomfort and shame. I mean, if someone is stopped in traffic or arrested, they must have done something – right? If someone doesn't get in to college, they just don't have what it takes - right?

In the next few weeks, we will be offering small groups to discuss the racial unrest that holds our country bound. We do not all see the issues the same way. The goal of our small groups and the 3week worship series (January 21 and 28 and February 4) is to look at our lives as Christian disciples and search for ways that we can move toward a life together that emulates Jesus' prayer for the disciples just before his death:

The glory that you have given me I have given them, so that they may be one, as we are one, I in them and you in me, that they may become completely one, so that the world may know that you have sent me and have loved them even as you have loved me. (John 17:22-23)



I hope you will join me in seeking to grow in the ways of discipleship as we relate to all of God's children – to be one in Christ as the Savior prayed.
