From the Pastor

Dear Friends,

In the ancient church (and in some of the Orthodox churches of today), Easter was the day of Baptism. Converts to Christianity were taught and prepared throughout Lent and then brought to the waters of Baptism on Easter Sunday, often at the First Service of Easter at about midnight. When I think about that, I "see" lots of candles or torches in the dark and long lines of people in white robes heading out of caves for the nearest stream or river. If I remember my church history correctly, it was dangerous business to convert to Christianity, so the beginning of the services (at least) had to be in secret (hence, the caves), and the baptism at night was not because of the great atmosphere!

We won't be doing any baptisms on Easter Sunday, but one of the scriptures for that morning celebrates our baptism and its meaning. Romans 6:5 (The Message¹) says: Each of us is raised into a light-filled world by God so that we can see where we're going in our new grace-sovereign country. We can see where we're going! We've been talking about this journey with Jesus throughout Lent, more or less watching Jesus, and now, the scripture tells us that we can see for ourselves - we know how and where to walk in the world to be the hands and feet of Christ!

Resurrection and Baptism – great causes for celebration and joy! I hope you don't miss out!

So as we move through the last 2 Sundays of Lent and into Easter, we will continue our series on Walking with Jesus with the last 2 Lenten Sundays and then celebrate the Resurrection

on Easter Sunday with glorious music and liturgical dance.

Lent 5: An Emergency Dash to Bethany (April 6) – Bethany, though not Jesus' birthplace, was like going home for Jesus. What did it mean for Jesus to delay his trip to Bethany when his best friends called for him?

Lent 6: By the Side of His Donkey (April 13 – Palm/Passion Sunday) – On this day, we will be part of the crowd watching as Jesus enters Jerusalem. As he enters Jerusalem again, imagine the groupings in the crowd. Who is watching? And what are they watching for?

Easter: The Joy of the Journey (April 20)

HOLY WEEK

Our services in Holy Week, on Maundy Thursday and Good Friday, are intended to help us get into the stories of the last week of Jesus' life.

On Holy Thursday, the drama team will offer reflections on what the primary actors might have thought about, beginning in the aftermath of Jesus' turning over the tables in the temple. We will take communion together and prepare the sanctuary for Good Friday.

On Good Friday there will be 2 services. The service at noon will be a community service led by the pastors of the Northwest Ministerium. Though it will not be a preaching service, it will be traditional in nature and in the music used. The service at 7:00 PM will be an interactive service in keeping with our walking theme throughout Lent. Stations of the Cross will be set up, and after a brief time of group worship, each person will be invited to journey through the stations, interacting with the particular "stop" on Jesus' journey to the cross. Worshipers may choose to walk through all of the stations or choose just a few - in order or in what-




