This morning, I was on our church Facebook page, preparing to post a wonderful piece from NPR's Storycorps project. The project is collecting stories from many people all over our country. I have heard beautiful stories from veterans, hilarious stories such as the one about moving into a high-rise apartment building on Halloween and having costumed goblins screaming at the new resident who spoke no English at all (yes, it was "trick or treat," but she didn't know that!), and many others. The story about Officer Clemmons and Mr. Rogers was sacramental and beautiful. If you missed it, it's on our FB page!

A post popped up and stopped me dead in my tracks. It is a picture of a smiling family of about 5 posing with the huge, beautiful elephant that they have just shot. It broke my heart.

Perhaps it was particularly heartbreaking for me since I have been meeting with Mark Norris, Associate Professor



of Biology at Stevenson, who teaches Environmental Science, to prepare for our April worship series, *The Earth Is the Lord's*, and we had just had a discussion about how people often read scripture, especially Psalm 8.

Psalm 8 is about how we are to exercise care for creation in partnership with God. When read alongside Psalm 24 and based on the biblical concept of Shalom that runs throughout the whole of scripture, we find our mandate to care for creation as holy work. "Dominion" is sometimes interpreted to mean that the earth is ours and we can do whatever we want. In the

context of scripture, "dominion" does not mean "dominate" or that we can treat any of creation disrespectfully.

Rather, we are called to exercise the kind of dominion that God employs with all of creation. That is, God's deepest desire is for all of Creation to be whole and has acted since the beginning of time for creation's good. In this series, we will examine the biblical and theological call to exercise stewardship and Mark will share insights from his discipline as a scientist and a Christian disciple.



KIWANIS CLUB OF REISTERSTOWN ANNUAL PAPER SHREDDING


On Saturday, April 16, 2016, The Kiwanis Club of Reisterstown will be holding its annual Paper Shredding Event.

Fools for Christ

April Fools' Day isn't a religious holiday, though it may date to Pope Gregory XIII and his new calendar. In 1582, he shifted New Year's Day from April to January, and people who didn't believe the change were called April fools.

April Fools' Day may also be connected to the lightheartedness that comes with warmer weather, as well as to medieval Christian festivals that involved pranks, disguises and a temporarily inverted social order.

Yet, in Scripture, such reversal characterizes the kingdom of God. In 1 Corinthians 1:18-25, St. Paul writes that the gospel seems foolish to people who don't know Christ, that God's foolishness is wiser than human wisdom. Jesus "foolishly" inverted the social order, saying the last will be first and the first, last.

So if on April 1 - and every day - we live as "fools for Christ," we're precisely what he calls us to be!

An Emory University study has shown that fiction readers tend to be more compassionate. We know reading non-fiction expands our boundaries





SHAVING CREAM EARTH


God created this wonderful world and told us to care for it. Remember that by making a unique painting.
