From the Pastor

Dear Friends.

Come, Thou long-expected Jesus, born to set thy people free.

As you probably know, our Advent studies began early, so quite a few of us started "living Advent" before Thanksgiving this year. Thus far, the one insight that has been swirling in my thoughts again and again is from the second week's lesson. In Matthew 1, an angel appears to Joseph and tells him that Mary is to bear a child. "You shall call his name 'Jesus' for he shall save his people from their sins."

It's a familiar verse. Most of us have heard it time and again. The study raises the question of how Mary might have understood that as a young girl of 14, her approximate age when she became pregnant. Our study has us view this announcement through Mary's eyes after she has witnessed the crucifixion.

We see and hear this story every year, and many (most?) of us in the RUMC faith family have known it all our lives: "Jesus will save [us] from our sins." Yet, we often live as though we don't need saving. We can take care of ourselves.

During this Advent season, as we prepare for Jesus to come to save us, consider with me how Jesus' care for us, especially his **saving** grace to us, makes a difference in our lives, both now on earth and in terms of our future, eternal hope. Perhaps, with Charles Wesley, we will be able to sing:

And can it be that I should gain an interest in the savior's blood! Died he for me? Who caused his pain!

For me? Who him to death pursued?

Amazing love! How can it be that thou, my God, shouldst die for me?

Long my imprisoned spirit lay, fast-bound in sin and nature's night

...my chains fell off, my heart was free, I rose, went forth, and followed thee.

USING AN ADVENT WREATH AT HOME

Place four candles in a circle on an evergreen wreath or grapevine wreath. Traditionally the candles are purple, the color of royalty, signifying the coming of the King. Blue candles can be substituted. In the center, place a white candle, the Christ candle.

Families of any size and configuration can make use of the wreath as a way of centering their prayer or devotion time during Advent. While some Christians light the candles only on Sunday, others have found that lighting the candles daily can be a reminder of the quiet, reflective waiting and preparation valued by Christians in the midst of the consumerist frenzy of the culture. Here are a few suggestions for using the Advent wreath:

- In families with young children, use the wreath at mealtimes. Just light the candle (or candles) and say a simple blessing such as "Come, Lord Jesus, be our guest and let this meal to us be blest." Lighting the candle at bedtime can also be a way of winding down and focusing for all family members after a hectic day.
- With older children, make this a time to read a short Bible passage and have a prayer. Your congregation may have brief Advent wreath rituals or devotions for use by families. But in many families these days, schedules make even a brief time of devotion difficult. Try making a table tent with a Bible verse, and place it where busy family members grab a meal.
- Couples and single adults can use the wreath as a focal point for their time of devotions. In a busy and hectic schedule, an adult can simply light the candles and have a time of silent reflection before a meal. However you choose to use the wreath, make it a time to slow down, reflect, and savor the silence.








Mark Lowry, who wrote the lyrics to the Christmas

song "Mary, Did You Know?" says he 's always been amazed by Mary's silence at the cross, as her son was being crucified. Maybe she was remembering back to that first Christmas, she wonders, when she counted Jesus' fingers and toes.

"I wonder if she realized then that those were the same fingers that had scooped out the oceans and formed the seas. I wonder if she realized those were the same feet that had walked on streets of gold and been worshiped by angels. Those little lips were the same lips that had spoken the world into existence. When Mary kissed her little baby, she wasn't just kissing another baby; she was kissing the face of God."

Mary silently watched her son die 33 years later, Lowry notes — not just for the world but also for his own mother. "The baby boy she had delivered on that first Christmas was now on a cross delivering her."

Sometimes I find the quick conversations I have with people before or after church are too short to really get to know them. Do we share a favorite book? Love to visit the same places? - Paintbrush and water
- Black permanent marker

What you do:
