Dear Friends,

My article for this month (see below "Church Council Vision Shared on May 1") is a reprint of my May 18 Midweek message, so some of you have already read it. The information is important enough that I felt I needed to also share it here.

Church Council Vision Shared on May 1

Several of you have been asking questions about the Church Council's vision that I shared in the message on May 1. This article is intended to offer responses to the questions that I know have been raised (in no particular order). You may read the manuscript of the May 1 message on the website at http://rumcweb.org/worship/sermons/listen/

The Vision

In the May 1 message, I focused mostly on the benefit of adding this staffing in relation to young adults, and that is true. However, the focus on young adult ministry is really part of a much broader vision

of how we build life-long faith formation and discipleship as a congregation. We are building (or perhaps rebuilding is a better word) a program for all of life. Few would argue that we have some "holes" and one of those holes is in our young adult population and effective programming for that age group.

Our discipleship vision is that our faith family will be supported in their spiritual growth and development from cradle to grave, with age-appropriate ministries available all along our life's journeys. The council feels that the next step in developing our programs to that end is in young adult/young family ministry.

Why would we add program staff hours instead of adding another pastor?

Essential to our growth and vitality as a congregation is our ability to offer relevant programming for those who consider making our church their faith home. Organizing and developing programs and developing lay leadership is very time-consuming.

One way to think about this: A pastor's time is divided among a number of tasks and even the bestorganized pastor knows that every day's schedule may be changed at a moment's notice when something comes up that needs immediate attention. While that can happen to program staff members' schedules as well, it is not as likely or frequent.

We have seen the results of excellent program staff work in our congregation, notably in youth ministries, and the Church Council feels that investing in young adults (single or married with or without young children) is what is needed to take our congregation to the next level.

In case you're wondering, I am 100% in agreement. I believe that adding program staff hours will be much more helpful to all of us and to me in particular than adding a pastoral position at this point.

How can we afford this when we can't afford another pastor?

Without the support of the congregation, the truth is that we can't. Howev-

er, the 2016 budget included half of the amount needed for the annual salary because the idea was to commence the position on July 1 of this year. We would need to double that amount in the 2017 budget.

Things you need to know:

Our 2016 budget was adopted with an \$18,000 deficit. It was developed using real numbers from 2015 expenditures and giving, as well as 2016 pledges and an estimate of giving for 2016 from those who do not pledge (an annual reality in our church and most churches).

Our giving record as of today shows that we are not currently on track to fully fund this budget. Therefore, I included an appeal to the congregation to increase their current giving in order to fully fund the budget.

On May 1, I asked everyone to increase their giving and said, "Can you increase your giving by 2% or \$50 or more a month to contribute to making this vision a reality?" Here's what I mean by that: I know that family realities are different in each of our households and not everyone can consider the same increase in their giving. Some may be able to increase by 2% of whatever they are currently giving. Others may be able to give more than that. Simple math tells me that if 100 families in our congregation increased their giving by \$50 each month, we would more than fully fund our budget, including the added staff hours for the whole year and many of the unexpected expenses that can arise (like extra snow removal). Congregational finance is not structured like dues. In fact offerings are in no way, shape or form like dues. Giving is a faith commitment. My prayer is that each of us will consider what we can contribute to put us in a solid financial position as we move forward to act on the vision God has planted in the hearts and minds of this church's leaders.

A final note on adding Pastoral or Staff hours. RUMC has a history of adding pastoral positions, so it's familiar and "normal." Some of you have been kind enough to question why we aren't adding another pastor "to help Vivian." Recent scholarship has advised that adding staff rather than pastors when a church is between about 150 and 350 in worship is much more effective in developing or redeveloping the church. I agree. With adequate staff help, especially staff that is theologically trained for the kind of discipleship work that we need here, it will make the work of your pastor more focused.

From the Food Pantry

We served 226 families in April

WE ARE IN NEED OF PLASTIC BAGS!!!

What a year we had! The food pantry handed out 2,178 bags of food in 2013. This served 548 individual families. Over 55,000 lbs. of food were handed out, plus 55 bags of school supplies, unlimited clothing, toiletries, cleaning supplies, household items, Panera Bread, and Wawa items. We had over 90 volunteers participate in this ministry adding up to over 3000 volunteer hours. The Community Luncheon opened in April. We served 430 meals and froze 340 meals for distribution at the food pantry. Thirtytwo volunteers donated 850 hours of service. In addition, the church was instrumental in sponsoring 19 families for Christmas this year. If you would like to be involved in these ministries in the coming year, there are lots of ways to be a part of the team. 


